Examinations:

Internal Assessment Test:

- 1) The Internal Assessment test shall be held for the first 20% of the syllabus having 20/30 marks i.e. covering first unit out of five units.
- 2) It will comprise of three long answer type questions of 5/8 marks each and students will have to attempt any two and 7/10 short answer type questions of 2 marks each and student will have to attempt any 5/7 questions.

End Semester Examination: It will be of two parts

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- 1) Part A: It will comprise of 5 questions of 2/3 marks and 6/9 questions of 1 mark. (Short answer/objective type question of 16/24 marks) covering all five units with equal weightage to all units.
- 2) Part B: Comprising of eight long answer questions of 16/24 marks each, from 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 5th units. Two questions shall be set from each unit and student will have the internal choice.
- 3) Each question of 16/24 marks will have two parts:
- i) Long answer question of 12/18 marks.
- ii) Short answer question/numerical of 4/6 marks.

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
