Aim:

The programme has been designed to impart a sound knowledge of English Literature and language to the students. The programme endeavours to make them abreast of the knowledge being imparted in similar courses offered by the leading universities in the country.

About the Curriculum:

- 1. The syllabus envisages to inculcate not only a love for English Literature but also provide the students with a comprehensive knowledge required to carve a rewarding career
- 2. To provide a critical insight in the evolution and development of English Literature and Language.
- 3. By including the papers on New Literatures, Women Writing, Indian Literature in Translation etc., is to offer the PG student a literary exposure wider than just British Literature.
- 4. By including the various components of English Language and Linguistics the syllabus aims to provide the students with a better grasp over English Language.
- 5. The syllabus endeavours to equip the students for important competitive examinations like the NET and the SET, as well as to stimulate them later in their academic career towards research or English Language Teaching.

Duration:

The programme is of two years comprising of four semesters of six months each.

Eligibility for Admission:

A B.A. Pass candidate with English as one of the subjects in Graduation.

Intake of students:

There will be a provision to admit 40 students. That can be revised by the University from time to time.

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Reservation:

The reservation of seats in the programme and Fee concession is subject to the decision of the competent authorities of the University.

Fee Structure:

Rs. 14,000/- annually or as fixed by the University Finance Committee.

Attendance:

Every candidate will be required to attend a minimum of 75% of the total classes. The shortfall in attendance may be condoned by the competent authorities as per the relevant ordinances on the subject.

Examination and Evaluation:

Each semester has four papers of 100 marks.

In all the papers of all the semesters except Paper XV (B) – Essay and Paper XVI – Viva Voce, there would be Internal Assessment of 30 marks. The Term/ Sem end written examination in these papers will be of 70 marks.

The Term/ Sem end written examination in Papers XV (B) and XVI will be of 100 marks.

The duration of all the written papers in the Term/ Sem end examination will be of 3 hours.

The distribution of marks and pattern of questions in each paper for the Term/ Sem end written examination has been given at the end of the syllabus for the papers concerned.

The passing marks in each paper will be 36.%.
